St Peter's@TES Schools Awards – London

A group of 10 staff members attended the finalists' awards ceremony in London last Friday. It was an inspiring and event which celebrated the good work of all schools around the world. We were finalists for the International sector. We didn't win but felt very privileged to have been shortlisted and invited to attend. The competition was tough and included: secondaries, independents, specialist settings and international schools. The evening included a speech from Damian Hinds, the Education Secretary, a lifetime award for the late Baroness Warnock and a tribute to the work of the NSPCC. Many of the schools attending were from schools in areas of deprivation who are finding creative ways to overcome challenges. It was fascinating to hear about the work that other schools are doing to promote learning in diverse areas such as sustainability, diversity and inclusion. We felt proud to be there representing St Peter's and to see the school's achievements recognised at such a high level.

Eco-Schools Report: Green Flag Award

On Friday 7th June the Eco Ambassadors had a very important guest to show around the school; Mrs. Abi Newman. Abi came to St Peter's to assess us for our Eco – Schools Green Flag Award, the top award for Eco – Schools. Over the past two years our Eco ambassadors have been collecting evidence of the many ways in which St. Peter's is an Eco-School. We had three main areas to focus on; School Grounds, Global Citizens and Energy.

Thanks to the gardening club and the very hard work of Mrs. Webzell and her team, our school grounds always look lovely and everywhere we look we can find environmentally friendly projects going on. It was easy for the children to convince our assessor that we make the most of the space around our school. She was very impressed with the gardening area and also the Forest School activities which support our curriculum.

All children at St. Peter's enjoy a wide curriculum learning about many different areas of the world, many of us having contact with children from France, Japan and Ghana. Thanks to Mrs. Marshall and her International team and our recent International award it was easy to show Abi that the children all think of themselves as Global Citizens.

In order to increase all children's awareness of how much energy we are using as a school our Eco Ambassadors report each week in assembly how much gas and electricity we have used and how much electricity we have generated with our solar panels. We could explain to Abi the graphs we have produced to show how our energy usage varies over time. We also showed her the many posters and reminders the children have made for switch off fortnight.

At the end of our afternoon we felt sure the children had impressed our assessor, but had to wait for another 10 days before we received the news that we had been awarded the Green Flag.

Thanks to everyone who has been involved with the Eco Committee over the last two years; we now have to start thinking about which other areas we are going to focus on in order to retain our award into the future.
