


We hope you have all had great fun playing over half term and you are all keeping safe.

<p>Science Challenge</p> 	<p>Winnie the Pooh has a hole in his umbrella. Can you do an investigation to find out which material would be the best to mend the hole with? The material will need to be waterproof so you will need to see if water goes through the material or not. Watch the powerpoint attached and use the sheets to help you.</p>
<p>History / Art Challenge</p> 	<p>What do you know about castles? Listen to or read the book Castles by Maggie Freeman on https://collins.co.uk/pages/big-cat-ebooks <i>Username: parents@harpercollins.co.uk Password: Parents20!</i></p> <p>What are the parts of a castle called? What were they used for? Can you draw a picture of a castle and label the different parts of it. You could use the attached picture of a castle.</p> <p>Look at the painting `Castle and the Sun' by Paul Klee. What shapes can you see in it? Can you make a picture of a castle using 2D shapes?</p>
<p>PE Challenge</p> 	<p>Make an obstacle course for your family to enjoy inside or outside your home. Make sure there are lots of different obstacles to go past. Include a hopping section, a skipping section, a jumping section, a balancing section and a backwards section in it. Why not time how long it takes in seconds to complete the course?</p>

RE Challenge



Which groups do you belong to? Your family is one group but you may belong to others that will not be meeting at the moment...your football club...your dance class ...your after school club. How does it feel to belong to a group? What responsibilities or jobs do you have in these groups?

Churches are groups of Christians who belong together like families. The people who go to church often have roles or jobs they do in their church. How many can you think of ? Eg Vicar, instrument player in music group, organist, children's group leader, flower arranger, coffee maker, gardener, cleaner, church office worker, PA /technology operator. How do these different jobs help the Church community?

Challenge Activity: Find a complete envelope. It doesn't matter if it has an address on it. Carefully open up/unstick the envelope. (see photos) Can you make the outside of the envelope into the outside of the church? Then you could draw lots of people doing different jobs for the church on the inside part of the envelope. Can you add labels next to the people to say what job or role they have in the church? As an extra challenge you could make another of these for your home and family!

Learning for Life challenge



Colour the box template to make a 'happy' box. Make it as bright and colourful as you can. Carefully cut out the template and stick it together.

You could use a recycled small cardboard box instead, and turn it inside out by unsticking it carefully and then sticking it back together again inside out.

Next, take some small pieces of paper and think of some amazing or awesome things that have happened to you in the last week. Remember they don't have to be big things. Here are some ideas to get you started: *Getting a smile from someone special, seeing a beautiful flower, inventing a new game, laughing at a funny joke, hearing a favourite song playing, enjoying a walk in a new place, reaching a higher level in a game, learning to do something new* . Collect them in your box. Make sure your box is somewhere where you will see it every day so you can record more happy moments when they happen.

French Challenge

Creative Challenge



Have you ever seen a stained glass window? They are made of coloured pieces of glass that are arranged into a pattern or a picture. Some churches have beautiful stained glass windows. Can you make a stained glass window?

You could follow the attached instructions or just draw your own window border on paper, cut out the middle and stick it onto a piece of sticky backed plastic. Then stick small pieces of coloured paper or tissue paper onto the plastic to make a pattern. Next trim around the edge of the frame. Turn your craft over and you will have a stained glass window!
