Tree Planting





This week we had a lovely after school session where families joined staff and children to plant 3 special trees and many bedding plants to create a 'Be with nature' garden. The trees were chosen to particularly attract bees and butterflies. Within The Orchard, there is a large 'bug hotel', made by our children and lots of apple, pear and plum trees. Our aim was to encourage as much wildlife and insets as possible. We wanted to create a special community area in our school garden where children and families can sit and enjoy nature and maybe spend time thinking of loved ones that they have lost. During the school day children will be welcome to sit quietly on the new benches amongst the orchard and chat with friends or spend time quietly alone. We would like to say thank you to families for their generous pledgees and to Mr Cornwell who was the inspiration behind the idea. As from next Monday The Orchard will be open for children to use at breaktimes and lunchtime, offering a quiet space to enjoy, appreciate and be with nature.

Creation Pause Day

Today across the school, all year groups have been focused on learning about creation. There has been a wonderful atmosphere with a lot of dance, music, art and drama. Younger children become familiar with the Christian story of Creation, while as pupils move up the school, they learn about links with creation stories from other major faiths. In Y5 and Y6 the focus is: Creation and Science: Conflicting or Complementary? In this way, the RE programme allows pupils to ask big questions, listen to other's views and beliefs and begin to form their own thoughts.





Visitors to School

Over the past couple of weeks, we have been very fortunate to have arranged visits from both a rabbi and a headmaster from a Sikh school. Both visits gave pupils a fascinating first hand insight into the beliefs and practices of the respective Jewish and Sikh religions. Next week, we are looking forward to a visit to help us understand the Muslim faith. These visits support our RE curriculum but also enable pupils to ask questions and appreciate the multi-faith society of modern Britain. While Christianity counts for 66% of our RE curriculum, throughout their time at St Peter's, all pupils will have covered aspects of: Judaism, Islam, Hinduism, Sikhism and Buddhism.



French online meetings

While all of our Y6 pupils met their French penpals, on French day, Y5 and one of our Y4 classes have now also had that experience. It is exciting to meet the children on line and to be able to use the French taught in school to communicate. The first thing our pupils say is: Why don't they wear uniform and why are they wearing masks? The first thing the French children ask is: Why are they all wearing the same clothes and why aren't they wearing masks? !

We are hoping to be able to run a full charity day run by the children on the field. We are planning how to do this within C-19 restrictions but charities have lost out this year, so we feel it's really important that we make this happen. More details to come.
