#### World Book Day – March 2<sup>nd</sup>

This year we took a new approach to World Book Day. The whole school came off curriculum for part of the week to focus learning on a book set on African culture. Stories came from various African countries including: Kenya, Ghana, Morocco and S Africa. Although children produced some high quality writing during the week, the highlight was World Book Day itself which centred on using Art to access the learning. The outcomes were stunning with some impressive print work, detailed water colour paintings and jewellery making. Some of the work will be displayed in school in our new gallery area. This holistic approach meant that we were able to target several strands of learning at once: global issues, Fairtrade and Eco themes as well as working towards goals for our Arts Mark and International Award.

The Ghanaian themed World Book Day raised  $\pm 350$  – thank you. It has been sent to UCC Future Leaders and will go towards their new building which is in the early days of construction.

#### Fairtrade Fortnight

We are about to reapply for our Fairtrade Achiever Award and Mrs Williams has been very busy collating all of the evidence of learning that has taken place across the school. Activities ranged from making chilli pancakes in YI to writing to our local MP, Jeremy Hunt to lobby him to encourage Waverley to become a Fairtrade Borough.



The week ended with a very successful Fairtrade cake stall which raised over £350. Children ran the stall and counted the money. There were some very creative cakes using Fairtrade ingredients.
