Let's get Sugar Smart!

As you are probably aware from recent news reports, we are all eating too much sugar. While some children look fine on the outside, too much sugar can lead to the build-up of harmful fat on the inside that we can't see. This fat can cause serious diseases in the future such as type 2 diabetes. Eating too much sugar can also cause tooth decay. The recommended maximum daily amount of sugar is the equivalent of 5 cubes for 4-6 year olds, 6 cubes for 7-10 year olds and 7 cubes from the age of 11. A lot of children are eating 3 times more sugar than the maximum recommended amount and the biggest source is sugary drinks. A can of coke contains 9 cubes of sugar.

Children in Key Stage I will be bringing home a Let's get Sugar Smart pack today, please spend time to look at it together. Children in Key Stage 2 may want to download the Change4Life Sugar Smart app for free from the App Store or Google Play. With this you can scan the foods in your fridge and cupboard and when you shop to see for yourself the amount of total sugar in everyday food and drinks. We can all help our children make healthier choices.
