New system

Leave of Absence

If you require special leave of absence then in addition to filling in the form you will need to make an appointment to speak to Mrs Dunning. We are having too many families taking holiday in term time and it is vital this is discussed with the Head Teacher in order for you to present sound reasons why you want your child to miss their education.

Penalty Notices – an extract from our Attendance Policy

The Education Welfare Service, acting on behalf of Surrey County Council may issue a Penalty Notice as an alternative to the prosecution of a parent/carer for their child's unauthorised absence from school and requires the recipient to pay a fixed amount.

The amount payable on issue of a Penalty Notice is £60 if paid within 21 days of receipt of the notice, rising to £120 if paid after 21 days but within 28 days.

If the Penalty Notice is not paid within 28 days, the Local Authority must consider prosecuting the parent/carer for failing to ensure regular school attendance under Section 444 Education Act 1996.

Circumstances when Penalty Notices may be issued

- The Education (Pupil Registration) (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2013, which became law on Ist September 2013 state that Head teachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances. The Head teacher is required to determine the number of school days a child can be away from school if leave is granted.
- Where a child is taken out of school for 5 days or more and the 'leave of absence' is without the authority of the Head Teacher, each parent may be liable to receive a penalty notice for each child who is absent. In these circumstances, a warning will not be given where it can be shown that parents had previously been warned that such absences would not be authorised and that they may be liable to receive a Penalty Notice if the leave of absence is taken.
- The issue of a Penalty Notice will also be considered where a pupil has incurred 7 or more unauthorised sessions during the preceding 6 school weeks. The parents' failure to engage with supportive measures proposed by the school or Education Welfare will be a factor when considering the issue of a Penalty Notice. Unauthorised absence will include late arrival after the close of registration without good reason.
- With the exception of unauthorised leave of absence taken in term time, parents will be sent a formal warning of their liability to receive such a notice before it is issued.

Pen Licence

Children are always proud of themselves when their handwriting is neat enough to use a pen. The school provides your child with an ink pen which has been specially designed for handwriting. They do not need to bring their own pen in.

Planning Ahead for School Residential Trips

The children absolutely love the residentials and gain so much from them. We suggest that you start to plan ahead for the financing of the trips and maybe put money aside in good time to make it less of an issue nearer the deadlines. If you ever have any worries about financing a residential please make an appointment to speak to Mrs Dunning.

School pick up is 3.15pm

We are having increasing numbers of children being picked up late after 3.15pm. Please ensure you are here on time to collect your child. Staff need to get on to meetings and continue their work. There are parents turning up late on a regular basis meaning that staff are spending increasing time waiting in the playground with certain children. If a staff member is waiting for 10 minutes each day, that equates to almost an hour of their time (which should be spent on marking or planning for the children

Zigzags

Please do not park or pull up on the zigzags during drop off and pick-ups. Let us work together to keep our children safe.

Equally please do not park near to or on junctions as this is very dangerous and restricts drivers' views.

BASE

Our extended care provision is really successful and popular. We are able to cater for up to 40 children. If your name is on the waiting list but you make alternative provision please can you let the BASE staff know so they can adjust their lists. Thank you.

We also looked at the topic: *Home Sweet Home* and thought about what 'home' really means. As you would expect, most of the discussion focused on family, friends and familiar places – a sense of belonging. This was then put into the context of how it must feel for those who have lost their home which prompted some deep discussion but was also a good exercise in empathy for others.
