I feel very privileged to serve as a governor and I've really enjoyed working closely with the senior leadership team and all the amazing, passionate and dedicated people at St Peter's.

One of our Y5 classes met with the Colombian pupils who were older than them but had prepared a very interesting and animated presentation about their country. We learnt about the culture, the wildlife, the religion, the climate and of course, school life. The Colombian pupils communicated very confidently in perfect English, telling us about the eco measures they take in their school to fight climate change. It is now our task to prepare a presentation for them (sadly, not in Spanish).

These opportunities really help our pupils to see the connections with the wider world and to find out about life in other countries. They take quite a bit of planning, particularly around time zones but they really add value to the curriculum.

honey

A new use for honey that we felt worth bringing to your attention. A button battery can burn through a child's oesophagus if swallowed. Giving the child honey every 10 minutes can delay and even prevent this from happening, which could help to save a child's life. This is because honey is slightly acidic which helps to neutralise the tissue surrounding the battery and protects it from more damage (not for children under 12 months). Of course the battery must still be removed as soon as possible.

Three days after World Bee Day, we arrived at school to see a huge swarm of bees who'd made a nest right next to the playground. Luckily local apiarists were on the scene in minutes to handle the situation. At dusk they were safely transported to a local hive.

yoga in school

I would like to say a huge thank you to staff and children for their support, interest and engagement with our yoga sessions over the last 5 years. I am moving on, to work with Eikon, a charity supporting mental health across schools in Surrey. I'll be training children to become Wellbeing Ambassadors and offering parent webinars on all kinds of topics. St Peter's is one of very few Surrey schools to adopt yoga into the curriculum in a very specific, classroom-based way. This allows children to see that yoga can be available to them whenever they need it - yes, it's nice to have a mat and a big space with plenty of time to dedicate to it, but that's not really how the world works. We have to fit these tools into our everyday, busy lives. What we nurture in our daily lives will grow. A couple of breaths, a little stretch and a moment to reflect can go a long way. The children are pretty much experts at that now, so I'm hopeful for the future!

dogs

We are aware that a number of parents tie their dogs to the school fence at drop-off and pick-up times. It would be very helpful if parents and carers could speak to their children about asking the dog owner for permission, before they approach the dog. Whilst we haven't had any incidents recently, this is a good opportunity to remind children.

carpark etiquette

Please could we remind parents that they should not be parking in the staff carpark (unless using the disabled bay). This applies at both ends of the day. There have been a few scary moments when a small child appears from nowhere as a member of staff is reversing. We are not expecting children to be walking around the carpark at those times.

We would also ask that small children do not weave in and out of the cars at pick up. Obviously again, safety is the main concern but also, a child was seen running a stick down a car door!

Please do not park on the yellow zig zags. We get calls which we then have to respond to. It all takes time out of what we need to be doing and it's unnecessary. Thank you.

lunchboxes

Many lunchboxes are not being collected at the end of the day and are just being left on the trolleys. This is hygiene hazard as they often contain rotting food and then sit alongside fresh lunchboxes. They are also an eyesore when we show visitors around the school. We have no option but to dispose of the lunchboxes and endless plastic carrier bags. But this shouldn't be the job of someone in school. There are also a couple of children who bring in their food in a plastic takeaway container which they leave behind each day, only to bring in a new one the following day! Please can we ask parents to be on top of this. It does not fit with our eco efforts.

In the same light, lunchboxes left on outside trolleys are regularly pulled down by foxes at night and found with all the wrappers, strewn all over the field. Even the foxes don't take the rotten food - that is for our staff to clear up before the rats move in.

(Since drafting this last week, we have cleared up a putrid black liquid from the carpet. It had oozed out of a lunchbox, down the trolley and on to the floor! Who knows what solid food substance it once was?)

sun hats & sun screen
